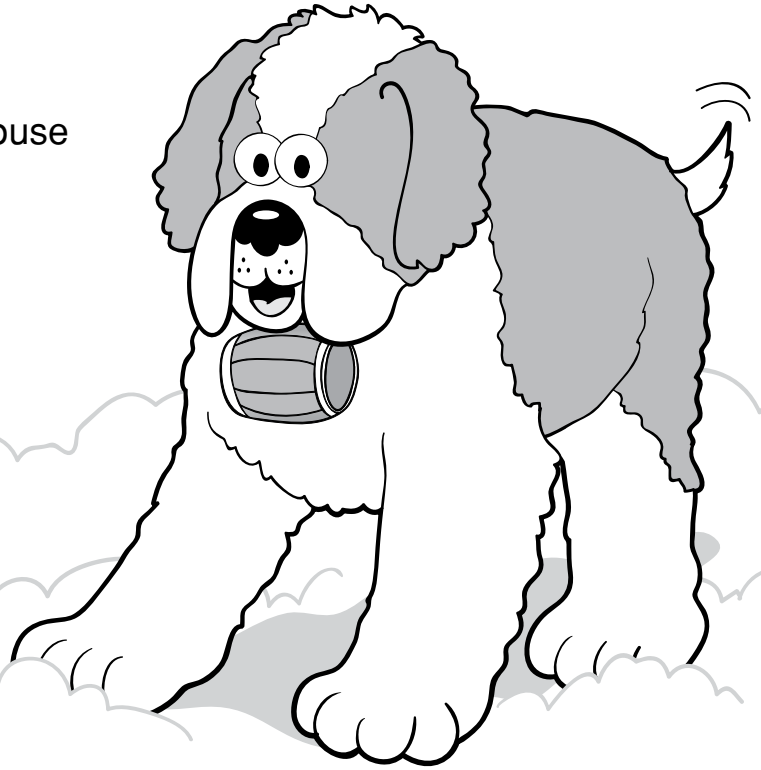


Saint Bernard Sort
